## Film receives US EPA's Clean Air Excellence Award

On May 13, at a ceremony in Washington DC, the Ventura County Air Pollution Control District was honored by receiving the prestigious 2008 United States Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) Clean Air Excellence Award. The APCD film, *Air – the search for one clean breath*, won in the Education/ Outreach category. District public information manager and executive producer and co-writer of the film, Barbara L. Page, accepted the award. The film was shown to over 200 attendees prior to the ceremony. The District is the only recipient to receive the award in this category three times. Previous awards for the APCD were in 2000, the first year of the awards program, and again in 2004.

According to Page, "We were privileged to receive the award in 2000 and 2004 for our public information programs, but this year is especially gratifying. I think it is because of the international scope of this film and the long reach of its air quality message to viewers not just here in

Ventura County, but around the world."

EPA Administrator Lisa P. Jackson comments, "Each year, our Clean Air



Excellence Award winners offer amazing new examples of how we keep our air safe and clean. This year's winners have built on that tradition of innovation to show what is possible in protecting human health and the environment." And Ventura County air pollution control officer Mike Villegas adds, "I am proud of our public information division and the co-sponsors of this exceptional film, Media 360, Loma

Linda University Medical Center, Dubscape, Inc., and the US EPA. It proves yet again what can be accomplished with solid partnerships and a dedication to clean air."

The Award Program is sponsored by EPA's Office of Air and Radiation and was originally suggested by the Clean Air Act Advisory Committee, a senior-level policy committee.

Other 2008 Clean Air Excellence Award recipients include Caterpillar Inc., Kenworth Truck Company, LEHR Inc., Tri-County Transportation District of Oregon & Engineered Machined Products Inc., City of Tulare, California, Garlock Sealing Technologies, Renaissance Fireplaces, The Consensus Building Institute, North Central Texas Council of Governments, Nez Perce Tribe Air Quality Program, Port of Long Beach, Stonyfield Farm, and Dr. William Malm of the National Park Service.

Page also reports that she met with California Congresswoman Lois Capps, 23<sup>rd</sup> District, in the Capitol Building. Congresswoman Capps distributed a news

release congratulating the District on its award. "I am so proud of the Ventura County Air Pollution Control District and Barbara Page. This film is an important tool that can be used in our community and across the county to better inform the public about the need for clean air and the importance of fighting pollution."

### **Some film updates**

Since its national premiere at the EPA Air Now Conference in April 2008, the film has been shown to thousands of viewers nationally and internationally. It was shown at the University of Sydney; The Ministry of Living & Sport and the Clean Air Forum in Vancouver, British Columbia; and in England, on the Isle of Guernsey, and in London.

Here, air agencies in Iowa, Ohio, Florida, North Dakota, New Mexico, Indiana, New Jersey, Michigan, Washington, Oregon, Kentucky, New York, Texas and California have reported showing the film in their areas. Both the California Environmental Protection Agency and the United States Environmental Protection Agency have shown the film to their employees. In Albuquerque, New Mexico, it was broadcast on KRQE and KASA television.

From a small coffee shop in Kentucky, to the International Future is Green Conference in Long Beach, the film has shared its message with many audiences. It has been previewed at museums, libraries, theaters, schools, and community forums.

Page admits that her main focus has been to get the film, "out and about" here in Ventura County. These are a few of the county locations where the film has been shown:

**Hearing Board Vacancies.** The District is seeking two individuals interested in serving on the APCD's Hearing Board. 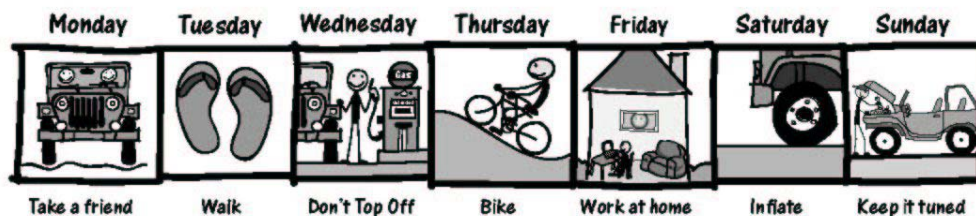

**Health effects update.** On May 28, the **California Air Resources Board** heard the results of a recently published study in the *New England Journal of Medicine* that shows reducing air pollution improves life expectancy. The study investigates the association between fine particulate matter and life expectancy in 51 U.S. metropolitan areas, and found that for every decrease of 10 micrograms per meter cubed of fine particulate matter, life expectancy increased by seven months. Since the late 1970s, improvements in health care, lifestyle and diet have increased the average life expectancy in the United States by nearly three years. Air quality improvements alone accounted for nearly five months of that increase.

**And another study.** According to a study done by the **Harvard School of Public Health** (including **Dr. Joel D. Schwartz**, featured in *Air – the search for one clean breath*) children who live in neighborhoods with pollution caused by heavy automobile traffic, have lower IQs. According to Dr. Schwartz, they also score worse on other intelligence and memory tests than children in healthier environments. These findings raise additional concerns about the health of children living in generally poor urban environments near transportation corridors or heavy industry. The researchers speculate that the harmful effects may be caused by the inflammatory and oxidative effects of black carbon particles. These findings suggest additional research is warranted to investigate the effects of air pollution on the development of intelligence in children and on cognitive decline for people of all ages.

## June Board Meeting highlights

At its June 9 meeting, the Air Pollution Control Board approved the following actions.

- Appointed new APCD Advisory Committee member, **Marleen Luckman** from **Ojai**. Re-appointed **Keith Moore** as a representative of the **County of Ventura**.
- Held the first of two statutorily-required public hearings on the **APCD Proposed Fiscal Year 2009-10 Budget**. The final adopting hearing is scheduled for **June 23**.
- Approved two projects from the **Agricultural Assistance Program**, a component of the state's Carl Moyer Memorial Air Quality Standards projects, involving a repowering of agricultural irrigation pumps, are for **Fukutomi Farms** and **Saticoy Berry Farms**. Total cost for both is \$30,778.
- Approved outreach plan for the **Carl Moyer Memorial Air Quality Standards Heavy Duty Truck Voucher Incentive Program**. The program will enable APCD to use Carl Moyer funds to help fund the replacement of old, high-polluting, heavy-duty diesel trucks with newer, lower-emission trucks earlier than would have been expected through normal attrition. - Received and filed **Comprehensive Audit Report** for fiscal year ending **June 30, 2008**.

### on climate change

*Nine Pointers for saving money & greenhouse gas emissions in the kitchen, courtesy of the Flex Your Power website. Have fun saving and remember, if you can't stand the heat, get energy-efficient in the kitchen.*

- 1. Be a matchmaker.** Use the right sized pot on stove burners. A 6" pot on an 8" burner wastes over 40% of the heat. Also, use lids to keep heat in and reduce cooking time.
- 2. Don't peek.** Every time you open the oven door to look at the food, the oven temperature is lowered by 25°F to 75°F.
- 3. Nuke 'em.** Microwave ovens are about 66% more efficient than conventional ovens.
- 4. Be dishwasher-savvy.** Run your dishwasher after 7pm and only wash full loads. Use the air-dry instead of heat-dry setting to cut your dishwasher's energy use by 15-20%.
- 5. Appliances.** Many utilities offer [cash rebates](#) for ENERGY STAR qualified refrigerators or dishwashers. Some utilities will even give you money for bringing in your old appliances.
- 6. Skip pre-heating.** Except for a few recipes, the idea that you need to preheat the oven is largely a myth from the days of wood-burning stoves. Put your dish in right away and then turn the oven off 10-15 minutes early and let the residual heat finish cooking.
- 7. Refrigerator coils.** Refrigerators use more electricity than any other single household appliance. [Clean your compressor coils](#) annually to improve efficiency.
- 8. Invest in a pressure cooker.** A pressure cooker can reduce cooking time and energy use by 70%. They also help food retain natural juices and vitamins.
- 9. Test your seal.** Slam a dollar bill in the fridge door. If it slides out easily, it may be time to replace your seal.

## Air Pollution Control Board

**Paved Roads and Public Unpaved Roads and Certified PM-10 Street Sweeping Equipment** (Rule 55.1 and Rule 55.2 – New): The Air Pollution Control Board will hold a public hearing to consider adoption of Rules 55.1 and 55.2 on September 15, 2009. The proposed new rules will reduce particulate matter (PM) emissions in Ventura County. On May 26, 2009, the APCD Advisory Committee recommended adoption of these rules. The Committee made one modification to Rule 55.1, allowing the construction of swales (ditches) in place of paved or treated shoulders. Ventura County fails to meet the state standard for PM air quality, and a 2003 state law (SB 656) mandated that the District adopt new regulations to reduce PM air pollution.

Proposed Rules 55.1 and 55.2 will implement PM control measures adopted by the Board on June 28, 2005, but not included in the recent adoption of Rule 55, Fugitive Dust. Although the proposed rules are based on South Coast AQMD Rule 1186, not all requirements from that rule are being proposed.

## Public Consultation Meetings

**Architectural Coatings** (Rule 74.2 – Revised): On June 18, 2009, at 2:00 p.m., staff held a public consultation meeting on proposed amendments to Rule 74.2, Architectural Coatings. These proposed amendments duplicate the 2007 Suggested Control Measure (SCM) adopted by the Air Resources Board on October 27, 2007. Adoption of this SCM will implement Control Measure R-329 from the Ventura County APCD 2007 Air Quality Management Plan.

In developing the new proposed limits for the Reactive Organic Compound (ROC) content of architectural coatings, the Air Resources Board (ARB) evaluated the state survey of coatings sold in 2004, cost of compliance surveys submitted by industry, and South Coast AQMD Rule 1113, Architectural Coatings. The proposed amendments to Rule 74.2 and staff report are available on the District's website. Also, staff has posted a Notice of Preparation of a Draft Environmental Impact Report (DEIR) and Initial Study to comply with the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA). Staff is proposing to reuse the 2001 Final Environmental Impact Report developed for the 2001 amendments to Rule 74.2 as the DEIR, and to follow relevant provisions in the Ventura County Administrative Supplement to state CEQA guidelines which govern this proposal.

**Emissions Banking for Agricultural Pump Engines** (Rule 26.4.1 - new): On August 12, 2008, District staff held a public consultation meeting to discuss the development of a new rule that will establish a procedure for banking surplus agricultural pump engine emission reductions. These engines are currently exempt from the requirement to hold a Permit to Operate.

Emission banking will be allowed only when fuel use and hours of operation data is available and may require a restrictive covenant to ensure that banked emissions are permanently reduced. The proposal expands on the requirements of Rule 26.4, Emissions Banking, which is part of Rule 26, New Source Review. The EPA has stated that agricultural pump engine emission reductions will not be recognized unless Rule 26.4.1 (or a similar proposal) is adopted.

## Recent Board Actions

**Permit Fees** (Rule 42 – Revised): On April 14, 2009, the Air Pollution Control Board adopted amendments to Rule 42. The revisions include a 3.5 percent increase in permit renewal fee rates, effective July 1, 2009. For permit holders paying the minimum fee, this revision will result in a fee increase of \$16.00 per year. The Board also

adopted an hourly fee for the processing of Title V Permits to Operate and a revision to the 'transfer of ownership' fee.

District operations are funded by state and federal grants, automobile registration fees, and fees charged to sources of air pollution. The APCD receives no property tax revenue or general fund revenue. The fee increase is necessary to offset rising expenses. **Storage and Transfer of Gasoline** (Rule 70 - revised): On March 10, 2009, the Air Pollution Control Board adopted amendments to Rule 70. The revisions include:

- An exemption from Phase II enhanced vapor recovery for fleets equipped with Onboard Refueling Vapor Recovery (ORVR);
- An exemption from Phase II for E85 fueling facilities;
- A restriction on standing gasoline in Phase I spill containment devices;
- A requirement for daily hanging hardware inspections; and,
- A requirement to submit test results within 14 days.

## **Compliance Dates**

### **☑ *January 1, 2009***

**Motor Vehicle and Mobile Equipment Coating Operations** (Rule 74.18 – Revised): Revisions to the coating ROC content limits in Rule 74.18 become effective on January 1, 2009, except for the following coating categories, which become effective on January 1, 2010:

- Adhesion Promoter
- Primer Sealer
- Single-Stage topcoat

Color coatings, as part of a basecoat/clearcoat system, which exceed the new 420 grams per liter limit and have been manufactured prior to January 1, 2009, may be sold and applied until July 1, 2009. The new low-ROC cleaning requirement at 25 grams per liter and a new limited-use surface preparation exemption become effective on January 1, 2010. ### **☑ *July 8, 2008***

**Surface Coating of Metal Parts and Products** (Rule 74.12 – Revised): Revisions to Rule 74.12 become effective 90 days after adoption, or July 8, 2008. The revisions include a lower ROC limit for general air-dry one-component coatings (2.3 lb/gal) and a new multi-component coating category at 2.8 lb/gal. In addition, a requirement to use cleanup solvents with an ROC content of no more than 25 grams per liter (g/l), or 0.21 lb/gal, becomes effective. ### **☑ *March 1, 2008***

**Registration of Agricultural Engines** (Rule 250): The California Air Resources Board (ARB) has finalized new regulations for diesel engines used in agricultural operations. In general, these regulations apply to nearly all diesel engines used to power irrigation pumps; however, they will not apply to diesel engines used to power farm equipment such as trucks and tractors. The new regulations have both administrative requirements and emission control requirements. An ARB fact sheet is available to provide additional information and details on these new requirements; go to <http://www.arb.ca.gov/diesel/ag/agengine.htm>.

To implement the state agricultural diesel engine regulations, the District adopted Rule 250, "Registration of Agricultural Engines" on September 11, 2007. The rule establishes a diesel engine registration program with a deadline of March 1, 2008. The registration program is not a permitting program, but requires application forms and fees similar to a permitting program. The fees are significantly less than permitting fees and are specified in Rule 48. Both rules appear on the District's website noted above.
